During 2016, Karen Bernard and Pamela Myers, members of Gaston County ECA, became facilitators in several of the three evidence-based health programs supported by NC Cooperative Extension and Centralina Area Agency on Aging: Matter of Balance, Living Healthy, and Living Healthy with Diabetes. Karen Bernard most recently became certified in both Matter of Balance and Living Healthy. Pamela Myers is certified in each

of the three programs. Karen and Pamela work with Gaston County Extension staff to conduct ongoing workshops (including day and evening sessions) throughout the year.

Just ask these ECA members why they have chosen to be a part of these Extension supported programs and they will gladly tell you! "Having taken the course, I saw the positive aspects of the program and would like to pass these benefits on to my community," said Karen Bernard. Pam Myers stated, "I've always loved learning and was a trainer most of my corporate life. I took the Living Healthy classes and was impressed by the content and structure of the classes. When our FCS agent asked if I'd be interested in facilitating, I thought it would be a great way to continue to learn and to volunteer in a meaningful way. And adding the Matter of Balance was a bonus of additional learning and fun!"

Since January 2016, Gaston County has conducted seven (7) workshops - total of 108 educational hours conducted - with 66 participants completing the workshops. As a result of what was learned in these workshops, 26 participants reported lowering their blood glucose, 32 participants reported being more physically active, and 32 participants are eating more fruits and vegetables. Many thanks to Karen and Pam, who are helping residents of Gaston County to eat smart and move more!
