


Wake County







Reports, reports, reports!

There have questions regarding the reports and how they are tallied. ALL hours (ECA and community service) are totaled. That total is then divided by the county's membership to obtain a number that is then used to determine whether the county receives a gold, silver or bronze certificate.

For example: County reports 7500 hours and has 85 members . . . that would be 88.24 hours per member. That is a bronze certificate.

Gold Certificate = 400 + hours per member Silver Certificate = 100 - 399 hours per member Bronze Certificate = less than 100 hours per member.
