Pantries of Wake County. Robin was joined by her co-worker Nathalie Uriale-Ayala.

She explained that a micro or mini pantry is a public and free storage of food. Pantries are often made from recycled furniture such as cabinets, bookshelves, and even lockers. Pantries operate on a 'take and give what you can basis', like Little Community Libraries. This

means that local communities are directly responsible for keeping them well stocked. Because these pantries are unrefrigerated and often outside, all donated food must be shelf stable. Micropantries are often stocked with canned food, bottled water, and packaged snacks.



Sara Perry and her club, **Raleigh Willing Workers** will head up this effort of replenishing the mini pantry on Crosslink Road. **Shotwell club** volunteered to assist with providing shelf stable food. This is a meaningful project and ECA members look forward to participating in such a worthy cause.


recognized for volunteering and hours contributed, cultural arts contribution, community services, etc. Our members came together to have an amazing program.

County Commissioner Wayne Branch attended and recognized the members for community service.


- Ruby Brinson was recognized for having 48 years of service
