Here are the 3 options that NC ECA members, families and friends can help support relief efforts in Western NC through NC ECA:

- 1. **Gaston County ECA** will be collecting donations of the items below to deliver to Operation Airdrop. All items collected will be flown to Western NC to help provide relief and aid to those impacted by Hurricane Helene. In addition to the following list, they have now added the following items to be accepted:

# Randolph County



**Randolph County ECA** visited the International Civil Rights Center & Museum in Greensboro on August 27th. Located in the iconic F.W. Woolworth's venue, the site opened in 2010 as a comprehensive testimony of the Civil Rights Movement and an innovative educational organization devoted to understanding and advancing civil and human rights in this country and the world.

The Center commemorates the February 1, 1960, sit-ins at a whites-only lunch counter in Greensboro by four Black college students from North Carolina A&T State

University — David Richmond, Frank McCain, Ezell Blair, and Joseph McNeil. Their non-violent direct action ignited the Sit-In Movement that renewed the Civil Rights Movement as a whole, challenging Americans to make good on promises of personal equality and civic inclusion enunciated in the Constitution.

#### **Orange County**

On August 3rd, **OCECA** held a workshop called Understanding Alzheimer's and Dementia at Antioch Baptist Church in Chapel Hill. Pat Tayloe, OCECA member, coordinated the program, while Ivelisse Colón, Orange County FCS Agent, offered education. The workshop was well-attended. Some individuals with young-onset Alzheimer's and their families shared their experiences with the disease and the necessity of distinguishing between normal aging and Alzheimer's.



In response to student needs, several **Orange County ECA** members gathered on August 24th for a County Project known as Cycle Care Kits. Although the Orange County Schools head nurse had secured feminine products this year for teens who had a period accident or couldn't afford products, she informed our FCS Agent that leggings, female underwear, and feminine wipes were needed for the same purpose. Our FCS Agent talked and coordinated with various



members to create and assemble what they called Cycle Care Kits. The kits contain underwear, two premoisten individually wrapped wipes, a quart-size bag for soiled underwear, and a bilingual Cycle Care Kit trifold with menstrual hygiene information, all presented in a canvas makeup bag with an uplifting message. Each pack was labeled with the underwear size. Jean Eddleman and Beverly Hester-Stephens handed 90 kits and 27 leggings to Sylvia Compton, the OCS Lead Nurse, who distributed them across the system's three middle and three high schools. This initiative was funded by Orange County Extension and a contribution from Walmart.

# **Surry County**

The Beulah Club meetings have been very hands-on in the past few months. In June, members and guests enjoyed a **Dot Paint Class** taught by club member Bonnie Cahall. This art technique uses dots of paint to make pictures. Everyone enjoyed creating a picture with this fun and relaxing art form.

In August, community volunteer Chrystal Mercer shared information on **Simple Home Repairs** you can do yourself. She included information on what tools women need to have in their tool kits and how those items can be used. This program was very helpful and potentially can save money while building self-confidence.

September brought pumpkins to the **Beulah Club**. Local elementary art teacher taught an **Acrylic Pumpkin Painting Class** on canvas. Members also brought books to stock the Little Community Lending Library which is in front of the Beulah Community Center. The Little Library has books for all ages and is a joint community outreach partnership between the **Beulah ECA Club**, the Beulah 4-H Club and the local chapter of Alpha Delta Kappa.

The **Pilot Mountain Achievers ECA Club** shared "**Precious Memories**" at their August meeting. Members brought items from places they had been and special times in their lives and shared about their experiences. Was fun and interesting for all.



In September club members enjoyed a program on "**Gadgetology**". Everyone brought a favorite kitchen gadget or tool they found especially helpful in their kitchen. After members shared why they liked their items so much, some participants wanted to add to their gadget collection in their own kitchen. Participants also brought gadgets they weren't using to swap or share with others.



Club The Siloam **ECA** visited **Minglewood** Farm and Nature Preserve (https://minglewoodpreserve.org/) for their August adventure meeting. Members enjoyed learning about this local non-profit whose mission is to connect students of all ages to the natural world and inspire a sense of environmental stewardship through place-based learning in the Piedmont and Foothills of North Carolina. Members made beautiful flower arrangements with a variety of flowers cut from the farm and then enjoyed lunch at Big Creek Lodge Restaurant at the Luna Trail Event Center ( https://lunastrail.com/the-big-creeklodge-restaurant/).

# **Cherokee County**



The Fall Beginner Sewing Series began on Friday, September 13th, which included the foundational skills and knowledge needed to get started with sewing. Participants learned about the parts and functions as well as the basic operation of the sewing machine, including winding their bobbin and threading their machines.

Participants gained hands-on experience using essential sewing tools (pins, fabric rulers, rotary cutters etc.), as well as basic sewing techniques and pressing seams. Sewing safety was taught as a priority for safe sewing practices and to avoid accidents and injuries.

For this first session, participants embellished their own hand towel using the techniques they had learned and were able to take their project home with them.

Each class in the three-session series builds on these basics, helping students gradually gain the skills and confidence to tackle more complex projects as they progress. Subsequent sewing classes in this series are scheduled for October 11th, and November 8th. These participants are eager to tackle their upcoming projects which include a half apron and table runner.
